

Winter Moths



When the nights are long and cold, we do not think of seeing insects, but spare a thought for the Winter Moth which can withstand freezing temperatures and can be seen on the wing between October and January.

For many of us, we see the Winter Moth in car headlights when driving in small lanes after dark, it is pale brown in colour and can be seen fluttering. They are attracted to light however, and so will come to a moth trap if you want a closer look. Winter Moths are widespread,

occurring in many places with trees and shrubs, so not particularly a churchyard species but, as with so many other creatures, churchyards will be a haven for them, particularly if they provide a space away from artificial lights which can be so disorientating to insects.

Unusually, females cannot fly, they have small stubby wings and are dark grey, giving them camouflage as they clamber up tree trunks to summon males. The females attract a mate by giving off pheromones, which draw in the flying males. Their eggs are then laid on the bark of the tree and don't hatch until spring, when tiny green caterpillars emerge. The caterpillars feed on tree leaves, eating a range of species including oak, sycamore, beech and willow. Caterpillars can also travel from tree to tree by spinning long threads of silk which act as a sail, carrying them through the air.

In the spring Winter Moth caterpillars are an important food for woodland birds, particularly the tit family. In January there is less food around and these small birds can be seen searching within the crevasses and nooks and crannies of trees for a range of adult invertebrates including Winter Moths, and also the overwintering larvae of other species. Why not take a torch-lit walk and see if you can see a Winter Moth or even, if you are lucky, a female on a tree trunk. Alternatively wait for spring and look in April or May for the caterpillars' chomping leaves, or a bluetit eating a caterpillar! The caterpillars are tiny, green and have a dark stripe on the top of their bodies. If you care for a church or churchyard then please consider the insects when planning outdoor lighting, having dark areas or lights which go off for part of the night can be beneficial to many species.

In the first two years of the programme, we have awarded $\pounds 1.65$ million to Peak District farmers and land managers, and we have a further $\pounds 3$ million to award before March 2025.

Successful support scheme for farmers to benefit climate, nature, people and place in the Peak District's special landscape is extended for one more year

Farmers and land managers in the Peak District National Park are being encouraged to continue to apply for funding to support landscape enhancement, access and conservation work through the Farming in Protected Landscapes (FiPL) programme.

The national FiPL programme, administered locally by the Peak District National Park Authority, has been extended 12 months, to March 2025, with an extra £2.4 million available for farmers and land managers in the 2024/25 financial year.

Since July 2021, the Peak District National Park has channelled £2 million to over 300 local farmers and land managers to bring benefits for climate, nature, people and place with an extra 1.2 million expected to be spent between now and April.

So far, the FiPL programme has supported 304 Peak District projects with works ranging from installing solar powered drinking troughs for livestock, creating habitat corridors for wildlife, to building a new hay barn to enable making late-cut, flower-rich hay, and planting close to 9kms of new hedgerows in the Hope Valley in association with the Hope Farmers Group.

In total, 35 ponds have been improved or created, 5511 trees planted, 49 historic structures conserved, restored or interpreted more effectively and 80 hectares of hay meadow restored. Educational access is being supported on 8 farms and 10 new permissive paths are in place.

The works bring benefits on the ground including supporting natural flood management, reducing carbon emissions from farms, improving areas for wildlife, and enhancing landscape features and historic assets. Many projects pave the way for enhanced opportunities for farmers to draw down funding from national schemes and/or enhance their business.

Phil Mulligan, chief executive of the Peak District National Park, said: "The National Park is a living, working landscape that supports communities and businesses, and is home to a huge range of habitats and species. It's also a place enjoyed by millions of visitors and residents every year. The FiPL programme has made it possible for us to support one-off projects that benefit nature and cultural heritage-friendly farm businesses.

"It's fantastic to see farmers taking up the opportunities to increase habitats, improve biodiversity, mitigate the impacts of climate change, and provide opportunities for people to enjoy and understand the landscape and its cultural heritage. It's about investing in the environment and people to help build sustainable farm businesses that look after the landscape now and for the future."

Some standout successes of the FiPL programme in the Peak District National Park to date include significant repairs to 300 metres of Doctor's Gate bridleway which protects sensitive moorland habitat; restoration of a stonebuilt Victorian water header tank structure at Sheldon; and support for the creation of wood pasture projects at Baslow and Hayfield and agro-forestry farming systems at Great Longstone, Green Fairfield and Wincle. At Minninglow, access off the High Peak trail has been provided to an award-winning limekiln restoration project.

Butterton Conservation Area Appraisal

The Peak District National Park Authority have commissioned an external heritage consultant, Ms Melanie Morris, to undertake a Conservation Area Appraisal for Butterton. This is an important document that will set out the special character of the Conservation Area and it will be used to help inform planning decisions in the future. Mel will be undertaking site visits on publicly accessible land (and on private property by consent) to assess the Conservation Area and she will be liaising closely with the Cultural Heritage Team at the PDNPA throughout this period.

You may see Mel walking around the village as she carries out her work. We'd really welcome any information from residents that may help us to gain a fuller understanding of the history and character of the village and what

makes it special. Mel is also working with the Butterton History Group and its archive. Once we have a working draft of the appraisal, we'll bring it to the community as part of our consultation process.
