

Sergeant Pilot Frederic Ralph Percival Burgess

Frederic Burgess was born in Derby on 14 March 1920, the son of Percy Alfred Burgess and Marguerite Burgess. He was known as Val to both family and friends.

Percy (1886–1961) and Marguerite (1888–1996) were married on 26 December 1911 in St Anne's Chapel, Derby. They had twins born 1917, John A C and Marguerite F M, who both sadly died in infancy. They had another son, Christopher B, born in 1924.

He was a pupil at Bemrose School Derby, an all boys grammar school, from 1931 to 1934. He then attended Queen Elizabeth's Grammar School Ashbourne, 1934 to 1939, before studying at Birmingham University.

Frederic joined the RAF in July 1940 and obtained his 'wings' at the beginning of March 1941.

On 21st March 1941, Frederic took part in a navigation flight in an Avro Anson aircraft, registration K6248. Piloted by Flying Officer Eric Walwyn Padfield, the plane took off from the No2 School of Air Navigation, RAF Cranage in Cheshire. While undertaking a practice landing at Hawkswood Copse, Hawkswood Farm, Rednal near Oswestry, the aircraft's tail struck an oak tree and crashed into a wood killing all on board. There was an inquest into the crash which concluded

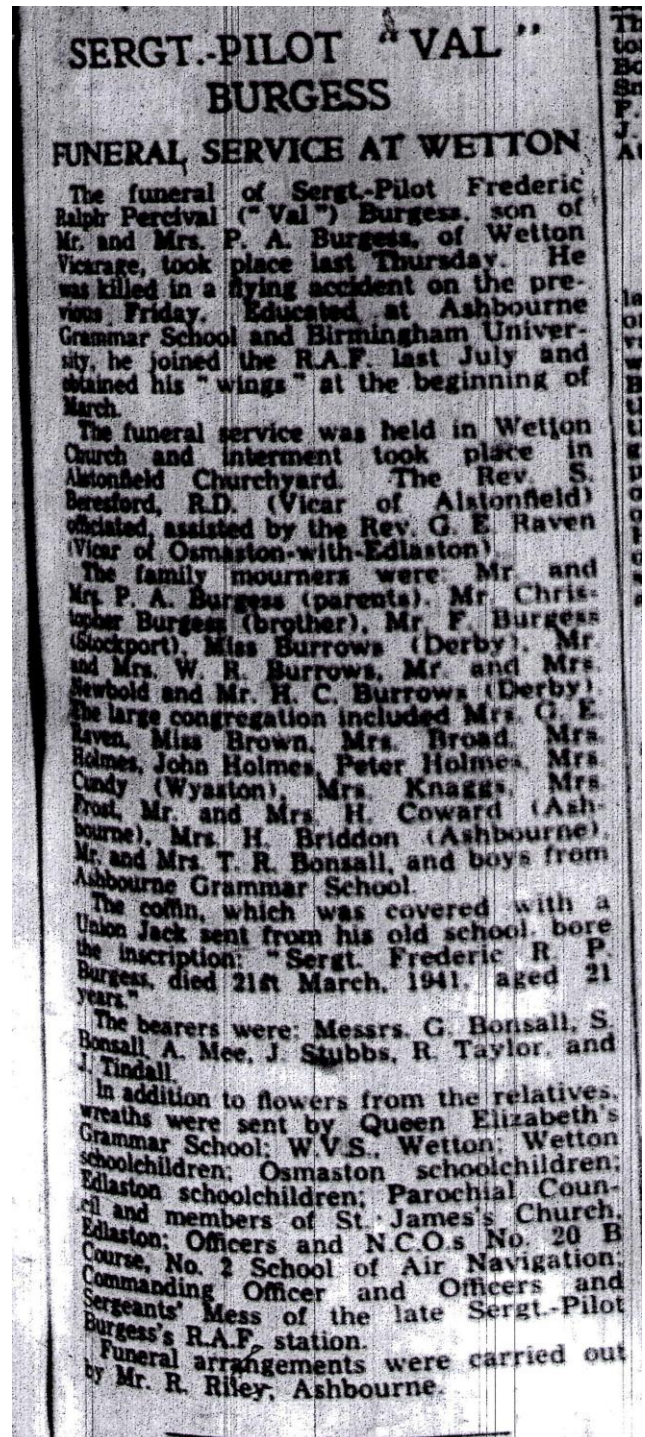
that the pilot had failed to open the throttle in time following a practiced forced landing and that he was not authorised to undertake such a manoeuvre. The report concluded that the undercarriage had been deployed and that it was not known why the pilot was apparently attempting to land.

Frederic is buried in Alstonefield Churchyard. His coffin, which was covered with a Union Jack sent from his old school, bore the inscription "Sergt Frederic R P Burgess, died 21st March 1941, aged 21 years".

A full report of his funeral was reported in The Ashbourne News on 3rd April 1941.
